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Activity of the Month: Soapy sensory Foam.

Just put a big squirt of the dish washing liquid along with very little amount of water in the food processor and wiz it. The more you wiz the more foamy and thick the foam gets. Now you may add a variety of food colourings of your choice.

- Encourages Sensory skills, as children see and explore the texture of the foam.
- Encourages Fine motor skills when children use it with a variety of tools or just fingers.
- Encourages imaginative play when combined with Farm animals, dolls for washing etc.
- Encourage Literacy skills when children may practice to write letters and their name in the foam.
- Encourages Language development when child discusses about the imagination and the texture of the foam.

Discussion of the month: Sensory Play: What is it and why is it important?

Sensory play includes the activities which allows the children to use different senses and stimulates their senses of touch, smell, taste sight hear. Sensory play is not all about touch. For example: an educator provides playdough to the children to explore and develop their sense of touch, by adding a few drops of vanilla essence in there she also is encouraging children to explore their sense of smell. Sensory play also helps children to calm, when children in sensory activities they are able to regulate their internal discomfort which can be boredom, restlessness or any other type of agitation.

Sensory play also **stimulates the brain development** in children. It allows the children, especially the babies to think critically while exploring their environment and use their sense in more meaningful ways. It **promotes fine motor and gross motor skills** in children, when children use a variety of tools and manipulate it in variety of ways allowing them to increase their coordination, dexterity, muscle strength and hand eye coordination. When children work in groups explore the sensory experiences together, it promotes their **social skills**.

When a child looks at different children engaging and exploring with material in different ways, they may get curious and try and explore the material I same way as others, they may engage in conversations with others and explain they are doing and how they plan to use the resource, promoting the language development in the children.

It also provides opportunity to use **cognitive development** in children, when they problem solve in different situations and use their thinking skills to overcome problems. It also presents great opportunity for educator to teach children about **science concepts** such as cause and effect, gravity, turning liquid to solid or vice versa.

In conclusion, Sensory experiences are very important and rewarding for the children. They provide them with opportunities to experience the world around them in "hands on "way and learn using their senses. Sensory experience provide open ended opportunities for children to allowing them to use the materiel in ways they prefer. Thus, Sensory experiences are great opportunities for children to learn and explore different skills or just engage in just plain fun!
